COP27: Loss & Damage Deal Struck, IPL with Faith Community in Egypt

You have likely read a great deal about COP27, this year's United Nations Climate Conference in Sharm el-Sheik, Egypt, in recent weeks. The big news is that wealthy countries agreed - in sessions that ran over the projected end of the conference - to pay for the loss and damage suffered by poorer nations due to the climate crisis to which these nations have contributed little. A *New York Times* article of 11/20/2022 stated, "The decision regarding payments for climate damage marked a breakthrough on one of the most contentious issues at United Nations climate negotiations." Our national Interfaith Power & Light organization had a strong presence at COP27. At the annual conference intended to review worldwide progress on climate change, the faith community spoke in sessions, held prayer circles, and questioned commitments of the U.S. government. IPL hosted *Faith Communities Leading on Climate*, and posted daily blogs about general activity at COP27 and the faith perspective at the gathering. In this video, national IPL President Rev. Americans Unaware of Scientific Near-Consensus on Climate Change

According to the respected Yale Program on Climate Change Communications, only 20% of Americans "understand that nearly all climate scientists (more than 90%) are convinced that human-caused global warming is happening." Meanwhile, 67% say they "rarely" or "never" discuss the issue with their family and friends. Only 20% say they hear people they know talk about it at least once a month. The conclusion: climate change is a low priority for most Americans. What can we do? Talk about it! Why not make this the year you when you start a conversation about climate at the Thanksgiving dinner table? A recent opinion piece in *The Hill* refers to informing the public about climate change as a communications failure. "Of course, much of this public ignorance and confusion is due to decades of fossil fuel industry propaganda. But the environmental advocacy organizations, their funders and the Obama and Biden White House share some of the blame: They have never mounted a campaign at scale to get the truth to the public." The Passing of Ecological
Economics Pioneer Herman Daly
We acknowledge the recent passing of
Herman Daly, at 84, a pioneer in
designing economic models that
integrate ecological and societal well
being. A recent UVM Gund panel was
part of an international webinar

honoring Daly. The event explored how to sustain Daly's approaches to economics "for a planet brimming with peril and potential". The panel featured Gund Fellows Jon Erickson (keynote speaker during VTIPL's Spring Conference), Joshua Farley, and Rigo Melgar, along with leading ecological economists Kate Raworth, Juliet Schor, and Peter Victor.

Planetary Economics: New Tools for Local Transformation with Kate Raworth; Challenging Old Economics in Classrooms.

Visionary ecological economist and author Kate Raworth presented the 42nd Annual Schumacher Lecture recently. "As an Oxford University Lecturer, Kate focuses on making economics fit for the twenty-first century. College students...have grown increasingly skeptical of standard economics textbooks. She calls the typical market-centered introduction to economics via supply and demand 'a very political act', rendering ecological and social harms as mere 'externalities.' Raworth credits the work of the late Herman Daly, author of *Steady State Economics*, as a more sane starting-point." Recording of lecture.

"The mission of the Nulhegan Band of the Coosuk Abenaki Nation is to strengthen our government; to build our community, and ensure sustainability;

to protect our customs and traditions; and to continue to promote our culture and celebrate our heritage while sharing it with those around us. The Nulhegan Abenaki tribe is nestled among the lakes, rivers, and forests of N'dakinna's northern range and headquartered in the Northeast Kingdom at Barton, VT. We also highlight Abenaki Helping Abenaki (AHA), a non-profit organization with the mission of "preserving the culture, community awareness, charitable endeavors, and outreach of the 'Nulhegan Band'.
