Caring for Creation: Outside & In



On September 27th, VTIPL hosted folks from half a dozen faith communities for "Caring for Creation: Outside & In" at Ascension Lutheran Church in South Burlington!

Together, we explored the question: How do people of faith actively engage this moment of unraveling with fierce spirits, open hearts, and enduring care?

We began by immersing ourselves in the living world as Reverend Nancy Wright led us in an hour of **Forest Therapy**. We learned about the spiritual, emotional, and physiological benefits of being in the woods and received two sensory invitations—each paired with 15 minutes of silence and slow walking among the trees. We then drank white pine tea and had a community conversation.

Afterwards, we broke bread together with an "Eating Lower on the Food Chain" luncheon, generously prepared by Ascension Lutheran volunteers. We had the opportunity to learn about Ascension's long-standing climate work and steadfast dedication to eco-justice.

After lunch, we had a **dialogue session** to hear from each other about what is lifting us up in this moment, what is causing us to grieve, what we are bearing witness to, and where we feel called to step into action. You can reflect on or respond to our dialogue prompts below!








"Caring for Creation" Dialogue Prompts:

We'll meet over Zoom on Nov 18th and 25th at 7:00pm.

"Here Comes the Sun tells the story of the sudden spike in power from the sun and wind—and the desperate fight of the fossil fuel industry and their politicians to hold this new power at bay. From the everyday citizens who installed solar panels equal to a third of Pakistan's electric grid in a year to the world's sixth-largest economy—California—nearly halving its use of natural gas in the last two years, Bill McKibben traces the arrival of plentiful, inexpensive solar energy. And he shows how solar power is more than just a path out of the climate crisis: it is a chance to reorder the world on saner and more humane grounds. You can't hoard solar energy or hold it in reserves—it's available to all."

As we work together for social and environmental justice, Rev Small invited us to consider how we remain grounded in a peaceful spirit. What can we learn from trees?

Cited by Bill McKibben as "one of the key figures in the religious environmental surge," Rev. Fred Small is Minister for Climate Justice at Arlington Street Church, Boston. A Unitarian Universalist parish minister for nearly two decades, Fred is also a singer-songwriter and environmental lawyer.


